Why We Ride

Ever ask yourself why we ride? I don't very often, but have on occasion, and the answers aren't obvious. A couple of things first: I belong to a couple of organizations and these may or may not align with their ideas, so these are purely my opinions and not the management's. Also I encourage others to write in with why they ride, my guess the reasons are as varied as our motorcycle community.

First off let me state some reasons that aren't on my list of reasons to ride. I don't ride for the "danger" or "thrill" (although those are part of motorcycling); as a matter of fact, I don't know anyone that wants to be hurt on a motorcycle. At times I have finished rides and have been relieved to get through the experience without harm. Those rides where there was hardship and a bit of danger are the ones remembered; and become the much loved war stories we love to relive.

"To save money" is another reason I don't associate with motorcycles. There are cheaper ways to get transported year round. Whenever, I hear a co-worker is considering motorcycling to save money, I think they don't understand or maybe they are just

trying to justify the purchase to a reluctant spouse.

So why ride? For me it's the cheapest smile-per-dollar I know. Consistently, I get on a bike and immediately feel something that I can't get as easily, as often or as cheaply in any other way. From a bike, I connect with places and people I would not otherwise see or meet. A bike is a machine to visit places like the coast, desert and everywhere in between. Driving into a small niche of a place to see something like the Steens Loop is not nearly as fun or practical in a car. A bike is also the catalyst for interacting with others over a ride or food. Motorcycle people are an adventurous, committed lot, and as such the kind of people I want to be with. Many times adventurous, non-motorcyclists will even come over at a gas station or campsite and start a conversation about where you are going or have been. How many out there have friends in far flung place that get together for bike trips that would not connect up otherwise? I like the way motorcycling enables the connecting of people and places.

For me I also enjoy the work of motorcycling. I like spending time in the shop working on bikes and then seeing and riding the results. Whether it's adding a farkle (a new do-dad), a tune-up, a simple wash or a complete rebuild; I like the satisfaction of seeing the result. A bigger machine is often too much for one person (boats, airplanes, etc.) where with a bike, a person can take on a project and see it to completion without always needing a hand. I do get help sometimes and offer help to my friends but I don't have the constant obligation (or money spent) getting another's help.

One other abstract reason I like motorcycling is the feeling of being in control. Control is something a

person does not have a lot of the time in our world. An airport is my worst nightmare with lines of people telling you what you can and can't take and do. Years ago we took an Alps trip, and I remember looking at the tour buses and the faces in the windows as we passed; I felt sorry for they were along for the ride, while I was deciding and riding as I wanted to. But when you throw your leg over the seat you are in control for better or for worse. You are now responsible for your own safety (and any passenger's), and every other aspect of the ride like where you go, how fast, and over or around what obstacle (tar snakes and tree roots come to mind). You are responsible and in control of what happens. Yikes! Done right it's a pretty good feeling; done wrong, not so much. For example, good cornering takes awareness of everything (roadway, environment, traffic, and visibility), picking a line, leaning the bike and moving the controls to give just the right amount of braking, lean and acceleration. When these tasks are done correctly you have controlled the machine and situation. That's an accomplishment many people cannot do.

Okay, so there are my reasons for riding these two wheeled motorbikes. What are yours? Write in and tell us why you ride. A sentence or more is fine. Any reason is a good reason, so use this opportunity to examine why you ride and share it with others. It may open your's or other's eyes to new aspects of the motorcycling experience.

Ride well, ride far, ride safe

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
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
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Central Oregon Region Ride for Pie on Pi Day 31415




NW Ambassador's Ride Report – March 2015

Still reeling from my no-show in February, your humble ride leader was determined to make up for lost time, regardless of health or weather. Turned out, no need to worry; whatever my ailment, it had long since run its course. And the weather? Well, it was another of those spectacular “winter” days we’ve experienced this year—afternoon temps in the 60s and nary a cloud to be seen overhead.

By the time I arrived at our regular start, Tigard BMW, the lot was crowded with many bikes I recognized; and a few, I didn't, including **Gary Thye's** ride of choice today: the BMW C 600 Sport Scooter. I figured the weather would bring out a sizeable following. What I hadn't counted on was how far many in the enthusiastic throng would ride for a short lunch outing with the group. **Chris Henry** came up all the way from Eugene. **Steve Woodward** arrived raring for more from Corvallis. And **Karl & Ramona Perlich**, who are always game for one of our rides, dispatched from Salem.

After a cup of coffee and a few donut holes, it was time to mount up. The beautiful weather had us all pining for a many-miled meander to somewhere, but it's still winter, so I had to be careful about what I planned. Past experience suggests that staying near the valley floor through March is the best defense against last minute weather changes. But just because we were staying local didn't mean we couldn't have some fun.



The plan called for a back-road weave through Clackamas County. Queuing up to follow me were 15 other riders on 14 bikes, including regulars: **Frank Boyle, Kim Dorsing & Janice Mathern, Neal Malagamba, Mike Ripley, and Andy Sulla. Ric Holderbaum**—our lone 3-for-3 2015 rider—swept, making sure we all stayed on course. Or at least, he tried (more on that in a minute). **Louie Robida** and **Bob Ingersoll** joined us for the first time this year. Gary's buddy **Phil Benson** also joined us...for part of the ride. You show up, you get credit.

As 9:45 arrived, clutches were out. A couple of quick right-handers put us on OR-217 toward I-5. My general rule of the thumb when on the Interstate is FIND ANOTHER ROAD! That first opportunity came as we approached Wilsonville. For a moment, we rambled south on Graham's Ferry Road, then headed east on Boeckman Road, through the Coffee Lake Creek wetlands and toward rural bliss. Once Boeckman gives way to Advance Road, the tract homes surrender to farmland that is much like it was 50 years ago.

But progress surrounds us, so the only way to continue our adventure without a ferry ride was to cut back through West Linn. And if one has to return to suburbia, Pete's Mountain Road is not a bad way to go. From its southern terminus with Hoffman Road, Pete's gets your attention with a couple of 10-mile corners, then a steady climb to the top of the hill. On a day like ours, beautiful views of Mt. Hood and Mt. Jefferson complement many of the finest homes in Portland. You must avoid the many distractions, for the road is narrow and as soon as you crest, you're diving down the other side toward the Tualatin River crossing, just upstream from its confluence with the Willamette.

It was at about this point that, I learned later, we lost one of the flock. Our procession slowed along Willamette River Drive, where we encountered a stop sign before getting on I-205 for a short blast. The stop sign and traffic spread us out. With only two miles before exiting, the group never got a chance to coalesce. Consequently, when I exited, the long trail behind me looked complete. In fact, the

last of the riders, followed by Ric, were well spread out. Traffic was heavy and the next turn or two were tricky. We had a gas stop planned nearby to regather and most of us made it with no problem. Then Ric arrived and announced that Phil had missed the last crucial turn. Once missed, there is no returning for about 8 miles. So, after a short wait, we were 15. Sorry, Phil; next time I'll be clearer.

Once back on the road, it was twisty roads and river views the rest of the way. Our pace was brisk, yet, with only 40 miles remaining, we took the better part of 90 minutes to make our way. Even an old hand from the neighborhood like Gary Thye remarked that we caught a road or two that he'd never seen before. That, as always, is music to my ears.

Despite the namesake view, lunch was...just okay. I did my best to warn them that 10-to-20 hungry riders were arriving about noon. When we got there, they shrugged their shoulders, pointed

to the bar and said, "Seat yourself." Fortunately, the place is plenty big, so pulling a few tables together was no big deal.
