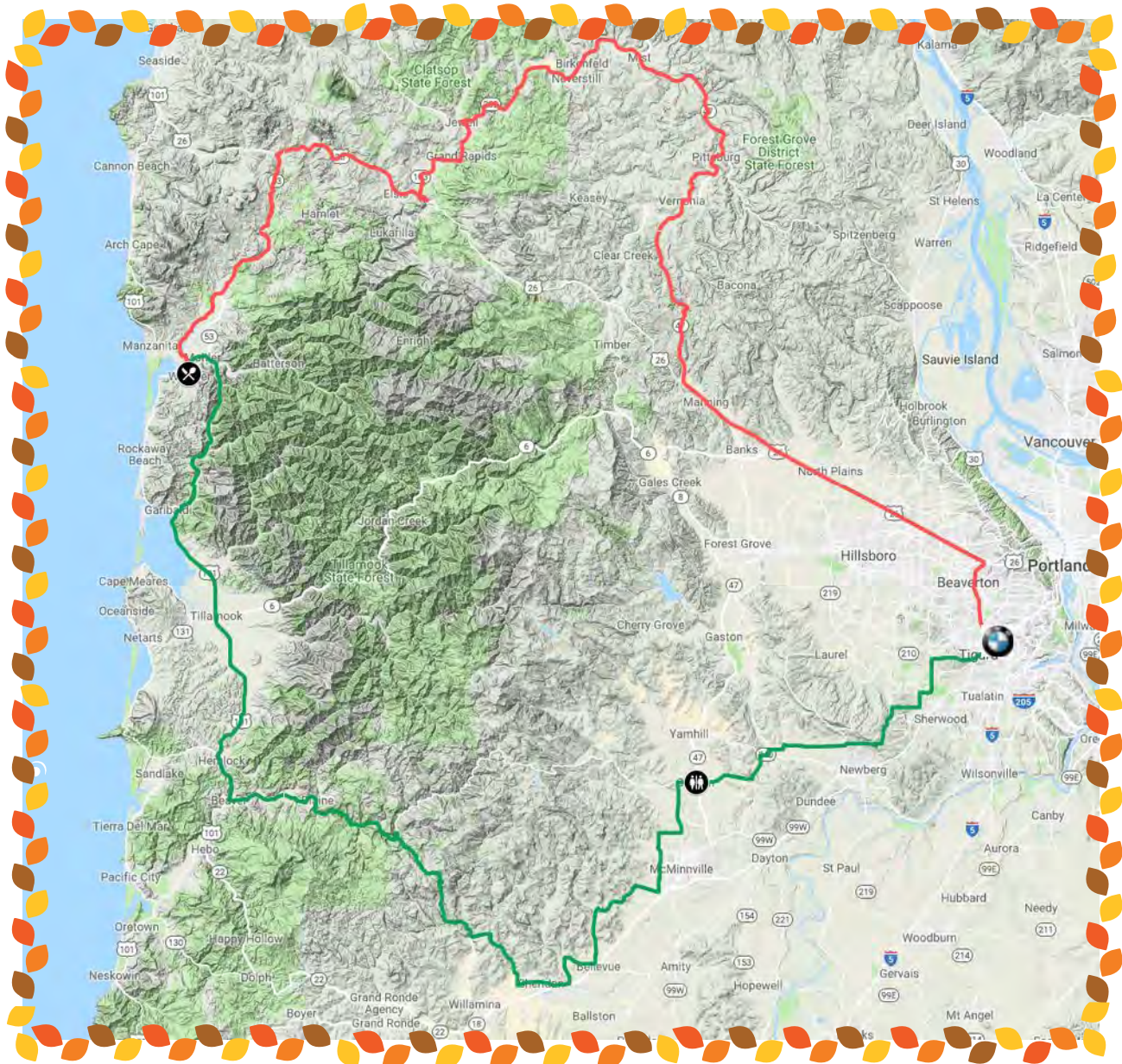

Wheelin' to Wheeler

NW Ambassadors Ride Report-October 2019

After our wonderful, mild summer, it looks like fall is wasting no time arriving. Cool temperatures and more than a few rainy days left us wondering how the October First Saturday would shape up. As it turned out, rain was not in the picture. But our first fog of the year was a reminder that the seasons, they are a changin'.

However, a little fog should never get in the way of a good time. Or that's how seventeen eager motorcyclists saw it. After a handful of donut holes, the crowd gathered for a quick refresher on the dynamics of group riding. As we would see later, the fog — or perhaps psychedelic-laced pastries — would play a role in a day of disjointed riding.

Today's ride was a westward meander to the coast. All of us know the main routes by heart; our objective this Saturday would be to squirrel out a few of the remaining roads not taken. Fourteen bikes lined up and began to roll along our familiar urban escape route. Following Diane and me were **Kim Dorsing** and **Janice Mathern** on their GTL and single riders **Michael Benedict**, **Justin Carr**, **CJ Strauss**, and **Jim Groat**. **Ric Holderbaum** made a surprise appearance after a summer riding around the nation and a recent three-week tour of Utah. Newcomers **Brian Palmer** and **Gary Harkins** were also in the pack, Brian on a K1300GT in mint condition and Gary on a brand new RT. **Andy Sulla**, **James Kim**, and **Charles Trapp** reappeared after a few months away. And **Cam** and **Karen Rust** made sure we stayed together, Cam on his GTL, Karen on her cherry red Spyder. At least, that was the plan.

Off to a foggy start...

Rolling down OR-99, barely ten minutes into the ride, the fog was thickening. Here, we lost Cam and Karen. The roads and streets were busy, and once into the countryside, narrow. So it was another fifteen minutes or so before we found a suitable place to stop. Five or six bikes stopped with me, then bikes seven and eight appeared. That was it. Fewer than forty minutes into the ride and nearly half the group was missing!

But GPS or not, everyone knew our first break was in Carlton. Pastries and coffee kept all happy as we waited and called to connect. Cam and Karen were on their way; so were Kim and Janice – along with three other bikes. After twenty minutes, we were regathered, plus one. **Carol Dallas** had motored over from her home in Forest Grove.

Together again, we rolled into the most scenic part of the ride. From Carlton, we headed south along Westside Road along McMinnville's urban growth boundary. Judging by the fresh traffic circles and new

construction, it won't be long before this corridor is as populated as Tigard. But another right on Peavine and the setting was as bucolic as ever. Adding to the landscape, the fog was lifting too.

However, we were still having trouble staying together. We learned later a family emergency called Charles Trapp home. And Brian Palmer decided to extend his Saturday ride into a weekend ride by heading south. Near Sheridan, Michael Benedict and Jim Groat missed a turn, disappearing west before we could corral them. The rest of us chased north on Rock, Willamina, and Bible Creek Roads toward Nestucca River and Beaver. Bible Creek is an especially delightful (and bumpy) treat as it snakes along the Coast Range under its canopy of trees. We were running late at this point, and, satisfied that all knew where lunch was, we focused on enjoying the ride. Bursting from the canopy and with the fog lifted, the rest of the ride was a spirited blur.

Wheeler is one of many formerly thriving mill towns along the Oregon coast. Situated on Nehalem Bay, its recent gentrification is manifested in the newly remodeled Wheeler Hotel and the recently opened [Salmonberry Saloon](#). We walked in to find a sweeping view of the bay — and Michael and Jim, who, after missing the turn in Sheridan had the presence of mind to beat a path to lunch. Though pricey, the service and setting were excellent. And the food? Well, let's just say that while it's been open a year, there's room for improvement. But I'm an optimist and when next in Wheeler, I'd give it another go.

It was now 4pm and we still had an afternoon route to enjoy. Folks that were in a hurry could blast home along Sunset Highway. The rest of us enjoyed a more meandering route. After a quick side trip through Nehalem, we found ourselves on one of the best roller coasters in Oregon — OR-53, a.k.a. the

Necanicum Highway. We've all enjoyed it. *Wikipedia* states that OR-53 is a narrow, winding roadway for most of its length, and primarily serves local and **recreational** traffic. No kidding. It's a twenty-mile country road with a five-mile motocross park stuck in the middle. Always a joy to ride, on a warm, sunny Saturday afternoon, it's almost a religious experience.

At Necanicum Junction, it was simply too nice a day to continue home on the Sunset Highway. We jumped onto OR-103 and scooted up through Jewell, then Mist and Vernonia, before hopping back onto the main drag. A few of us took additional extraordinary measures to avoid metro traffic as long as possible. As I pulled into the driveway, I noted the setting sun and lengthening shadows. The season may be running out of steam. But it's always great to ride a motorcycle in Oregon.
